A MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Welcome to the last newsletter of 2018.

Most of you will be aware I was granted a sabbatical for Term 3. My sabbatical was made up of two parts; firstly a short course at Harvard University. The course 'Leadership: An Evolving Vision' was for principals who have been in the role for over six years. I met a number of principals from other countries who were fascinated to learn about our residential setting. As well as learning from each other, a number of published academics presented lectures. We were pushed to the limits as we challenged ourselves both intellectually, and on the second day physically and mentally too on a high ropes course.

One interesting thing we learnt is that leaders who have experienced difficult challenges in their own life make the best leaders. I guess that is a good reminder about the benefits bad life events can gift if we learn and grow from them.

I also spent time adapting a self-control programme developed by a doctor of psychology at the University of Otago, for our students. The programme ENGAGE uses play (through table-top games, outdoor games, puzzles etc) to teach the skills of self-control and we will pilot the adapted programme in 2019. The programme is typically implemented by a parent/caregiver so if you are interested in learning more, my paper has been published on the

Ministry of Education website or you can contact me directly.

ERO recently visited HRC. While their final report is not yet published I am pleased to say we received overwhelmingly positive feedback. The reviewers noted that staff and students are proud to be part of HRC and that HRC is driven for a quest for improvement and excellence. They said they had observed effective teaching in both the day school and the residential settings that reflected the high expectations leadership has of staff and students.

E nga iwi, E nga Mana,


E nga reo.
