Term 3 tends to feel like the longest term. It is a time when we have less sunshine, more kaiako (staff) and student sickness, and this year Christchurch moved back into Level 2 Covid-19 restrictions. As the students got ready to head home for the school holidays, we were fortunate to once again enjoy the freedom of Level 1. We sent our thoughts to our Auckland families who continued to experience a much more restrictive and complicated time.

Term 3 saw a considerable amount of property improvement taking place around the school. This included repair work to the pool, replacement of the outside lighting, soft-fall added to the playground replacing the bark, replacement washing machines and dryers in the laundry area

and new heating (replacing the boilers and radiators) in the day school. Some of this work continued into the holidays which required the College to be without power for over a week.

Most excitingly, Term 3 saw the introduction of the new criteria for the RSS-only Pathway. There are two ways into HRC; one via the Ministry of Education Intensive Wraparound Service (IWS) and one without IWS support, called 'RSS-only Pathway'. The changes to the RSS-only Pathway were supported by Hon Tracey Martin MP in an attempt to fill the empty beds at the residential schools within New Zealand. The changes mean it has become easier to be accepted into a residential school. Please ensure vour networks are aware of these changes. We do believe there are many more students in New Zealand who could benefit from a unique residential school programme. We are trying to ensure as many people as possible know about these changes, so we can support more students in the future. Ruby enjoyed ten-pin bowling, mini-golf, carving, and pocket money spending.



During Term 3 the Makonui students continued to focus on their social and living goals, along with building relationships with new students and remaining resilient with everything that they do and encounter.


We welcomed in Noah, who has been super engaged in his goals and establishing friendships.






'I enjoyed going home to visit my whānau. I was happy to see my Dad and spend time with him, I miss seeing him.

Education Outside the Classroom


Ski Trips

Why are we focused on developing a therapeutic milieu at HRC?

'Every interaction by every kaiako with every child has the potential to make a positive difference.'

This year our focus value is whanaungatanga, or building relationships. Strong relationships are based on trust and respect. Richard Branson once said, "Respect is about how you treat everyone, not just those you want to impress."

In addition, the further development of our relationshipbased therapeutic milieu (or environment) across the whole of HRC is a strategic goal we have this year and will continue to focus on for the next few years.

The everyday living environment is seen by many as the most influential factor affecting children and young people in residential education. Research demonstrates that positive relationships with competent adults cannot be underestimated as it is within these key relationships based on positive support, nurture and guidance, that the child develops their sense of self and resilience.

In a 2018 study of children's outcomes in a residential special school, the researchers found significant improvement in the social, emotional, behavioural, and academic progress of the children in a school with a relationship-based milieu which sees the therapeutic work take place through the relationships with staff. This enables the student to develop a model which allows for future emotional growth as well.

Our goal is to ensure our residential care is relationshipbased, planned, and purposeful with a focus on activity and experiential learning, growing strengths within a therapeutic milieu, and a place wheree children can be children and have fun. HRC kaiako will undertake significant training in January to further strengthen our skill set in the therapeutic use of daily life events at HRC.
